Garden Twist Quilt Pattern - Step-by-Step Tutorial

The Garden Twist Quilt is a beautiful lattice-style design that blends alternating floral blocks with a clever twisting effect created by pieced strips. This pattern is perfect for showcasing a favorite floral fabric while adding depth and movement with solid fabrics.

Whether you are an experienced quilter or an ambitious beginner ready for a challenge, this guide will walk you through every step from cutting your fabric to assembling your quilt top.

Materials Needed

Fabrics:

- Solid fabrics (at least two coordinating colors)
- Floral fabric (medium or large-scale prints)

Tools:

- Rotary cutter and mat
- Quilting ruler
- Sewing machine
- Thread
- Iron and ironing board
- Pins or clips

Cutting Instructions

You will make 20 alternate blocks: 10 of Block A and 10 of Block B.

From Each Solid Fabric:

- E pieces Cut 2 strips 21/2" wide, subcut into 10 pieces 41/2" long.
- D pieces Cut 5 strips 2½" wide, subcut into 30 pieces 6½" long.
- F pieces Cut 1 strip 2½" wide, subcut into 10 pieces 2½" squares.

From Floral Fabric:

- Cut 3 strips 4½" wide, subcut into 20 squares 4½" x 4½".

Borders:

- Cut 4 strips 9" wide.
- From these, cut 18 triangles and 4 corner triangles.

Block A

- 1. Place one floral square (4½" x 4½") in the bottom left position.
- 2. Sew one E strip $(4\frac{1}{2})$ to the right of the floral square.
- 3. Attach one D strip $(6\frac{1}{2})$ vertically to the top of the floral square.
- 4. Use F squares and additional D strips to frame the floral piece as shown in the Block A diagram.

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5. Press seams toward the darker fabric.

Block B

- 1. Place a solid square (cut from floral or coordinating solid) in the center.
- 2. Attach one D strip to each vertical side and one C piece horizontally.
- 3. Complete the frame following the Block B diagram.
- 4. Ensure alignment for the twisting lattice effect.

Quilt Top Assembly

- 1. Arrange blocks in alternating sequence following the quilt layout diagram.
- 2. Position Block A and Block B diagonally to align the twist effect.
- 3. Sew blocks together in rows. Press seam allowances toward the D strip side.
- 4. Attach border triangles to complete edges, and corner triangles to each quilt corner.

Finishing Your Quilt


- 1. Layer quilt top, batting, and backing. Baste using pins or spray.
- 2. Quilt along seams or use free-motion quilting to accentuate the twist design.
- 3. Attach binding using your preferred method.

Tips for Best Results

- Press after every seam for crisp, accurate blocks.
- Use a consistent 1/4" seam allowance.
- Chain piece to speed up sewing.
- Choose contrasting solids and florals for maximum visual impact.

Block Layout Diagram

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30 Block requires 20 alternate blocks. Make 10 of each - A & B

From, each solid fabric cut: E's - 2 Strips $2\frac{1}{2}$ ". Cut into 10 $4\frac{1}{2}$ " strips. D's - 5 Strips $2\frac{1}{2}$ ". Cut into 30 $6\frac{1}{2}$ " strips F's - 1 Strip $2\frac{1}{2}$ ". Cut into 10 $2\frac{1}{2}$ " squares.

From floral fabric cut: 3 Strips $4\frac{1}{2}$ ". Cut into 20 $4\frac{1}{2}$ " squares.

Borders:

Cut 4 strips 9". Cut 18 triangles and 4 corner triangles.
